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As historians, we will

learn about the invasions of different tribes that led to the era of Anglo Saxon ruling in what is now Britain.

As scientists, we will:

learn about which plants grow and are suited to different habitats (Year 2), forces and magnets (Year 3) and how to make, test and draw simple electric circuits (Year 4)

As linguists, we will:

learn to talk about the days of the week, months and use time phrases in French.



As mathematicians, we will:

learn how to tell the time, converting digital to analogue and using the 12 and 24 hour clock. We will also practise using data collection tools such as tables and graphs. We will end the term learning about money.

As artists we will:

design and make 3D replicas of Anglo Saxon jewellery and stone creations



In PSHE, we will:

learn about how the human body changes during adolescence and why those changes occur. As athletes, we will:

practise a range of athletics events including running, jumping and throwing. All in preparation for Sports Day.

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As musicians, we will: review all of the different songs and styles of music that we have learned about this year.



As learners about different faiths, we will:

compare how people of different religions celebrate and commemorate key events within their lifetime.

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As IT specialists, we will: create a class Wiki and understand how Wikipedia is a collaborative tool.
